#### The Big Picture (2013)

Fiscal emergencies in Detroit, Pontiac or Scranton came as no surprise, given the chronic economic malaise these localities had experienced for years.

But many other distressed localities escaped mainstream attention.

Among them . . . Bethlehem, Salinas, San Diego, San Jose, Lansing and Philadelphia . . .

which entered fiscal distress after drastic declines in their fiscal reserves or significant increases in debt while largely avoiding headlines.

## Latest sign of Chicago financial stress: City debt up by \$1 billion

In recent years, bond rating agencies repeatedly have lowered the city's credit rating, with Moody's Investors Service putting it in junk territory, largely because of debt to city worker pension systems and a heavy debt load in general.

#### WHY??

After the Great Recession, New York State **cut aid to localities** and pushed down additional expenditure responsibilities to local governments. It has also limited local governments' revenue raising powers with the implementation of a tax cap.

## **Report: Ohio cities facing fiscal stress despite improving economy**

(Late 2017 . . .)

All Ohio cities and counties are experiencing heightened fiscal stress, according to a report from Ohio Auditor of State Dave Yost, but Springfield, Riverside, Lebanon and Cincinnati were included on a list of 13 cities that Yost said were a step away from facing increased financial risk.

# Clear Channel sues Baltimore, calls new billboard tax 'unconstitutional'

## THE BALTIMORE SUN



City Solicitor George Nilson said his lawyers have "carefully considered" four letters from Clear Channel's attorneys arguing against the billboard tax, but they remain confident the tax is legal.

#### "We will defend, and I believe we will prevail," Nilson said.

City lawyer Elena R. DiPietro wrote in a letter to the City Council that the new tax, which began July 1 (2013), does not violate the First Amendment because it is intended to "raise revenue and lessen the negative impact of billboards," not curb speech.

#### Baltimore: Tax Judge Rules in City's Favor (February 27, 2018)

- Baltimore uses the billboard tax for the general public interest, such as schools
- Billboards take up space, may obstruct views, distract motorists, and displace land
- The tax is on the privilege of operating in the city, not on "speech"
- Petitioner (Clear Channel) does not express or say anything, it only sells space
- The tax does not infringe on free speech

### City of Cincinnati - FY 2018-2019 Approved Biennial Budget

**Income Tax**: The City Income Tax is 2.1% of gross earnings by residents, non-residents who work in the City, and corporations located in the City.

**Property Tax**: The City's current property tax total is 12.10 mills per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Intergovernmental revenues are sought from State, Federal, and other sources.

#### APPROVED FY 2018 AND FY 2019 BUDGET

The All-Funds Operating Budget totals \$1.1 billion for FY 2018 and the Capital Budget totals \$504 million.

Creating this budget meant overcoming the \$26 million FY 2018 operating budget deficit.

This gap was brought on by the culmination of a number of factors resulting in operating **expenses outpacing operating revenues**.

These include a \$15.6 million **reduction in the income tax projection** coupled with increased payroll and non-personnel costs for City employees.

Adding additional pressure are the possibilities of **reductions in federal, state and local funding...**

This special meeting is also being held to allow for discussion and votes on Fiscal Year 2019 City Budget items and other budgetary items prior to the close of the current fiscal year.



Cincinnati City Council eked out the 2019 budget Wednesday, wrestling a \$32 million deficit to the ground with roughly \$10 million in cuts and a series of tax and fee increases.



#### **Cincinnati (news report)**



Council raised the commercial hauling tax; increased building and permit fees; raised stormwater rates; upped the cost of parking at meters; added a billboard tax; and agreed to ask voters to increase the admissions tax in November.

Council Republicans Amy Murray and Jeff Pastor and independent Christopher Smitherman voted against the admissions tax, the hauling tax, the billboard tax, meter changes, and developer fees.

On the billboard tax, three members of the Norton family, which owns Norton Advertising, complained during comment that the tax is illegal because sign companies already pay permit fees; it essentially applies to only two companies; and it was slipped through committee with no time for them to respond. (Mayor) Cranley expressed concern billboard owners might sue. Cincinnati

An Ordinance No. 147 - 2018

#### Sec. 313-7. - Tax Not to be Separately Stated or Charged.

- (a) The tax shall not be stated or charged separately from the rent or other consideration paid by an advertiser for use or occupancy of an outdoor advertising sign or shown separately on any record thereof, or otherwise reflected upon any bill, statement, or charge made for the sign's use or occupancy issued or delivered by the advertising host.
- (b) No advertising host shall state in any manner, whether directly or indirectly, that the tax or any part thereof will be assumed or absorbed by an advertiser, or that it will be added to the rent or other charge.

#### **Bottom line**



Cities are/will be under pressure

Baltimore, Cincinnati, and Philadelphia have targeted billboard taxes:

- o Court-approved in Baltimore (based on space)
- Paid by billboard companies in Philly (7 percent)
- Helped resolve the budget shortfall in Cincy

## Is your city "Home Rule?"

- Delegation of authority from the state to an administrative division
- Some states are "home rule" states and others grant limited home rule
- Each state defines what powers it grants to local governments
- Four spheres of discretion to localities
  - One of those four is fiscal (to determine revenue sources, set tax rates, borrow funds

#### The state role?



2005 Missouri Revised Statutes - § 71.288. — Restrictions on outdoor advertising-fee.

1. Any city or county shall have the authority to adopt regulations with respect to outdoor advertising that are more restrictive than the height, size, lighting and spacing provisions of sections 226.500 to 226.600, RSMo.

2. No city or county shall have the authority to impose a **fee of more than five hundred dollars** for the initial inspection of an outdoor advertising structure, nor may the city or county impose a business tax on an outdoor advertising structure of more than **two percent** of the gross annual revenue produced by the outdoor advertising structure within that city or county.

### **Top Five States**


Florida, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, and Wyoming rank in the top five states.



Harrisburg's City Council is the Legislative Branch of City government. The City Council consists of seven members who are elected at large. The City Council President is elected by the Council members and presides over the Council meetings. In the event of illness or absence, the Vice-President presides over the meetings.

- Stopped sending mailers 10 years ago!
- Must publish notice (per state law)
- Posts notice on website
- Must put signs on the door at city hall (to comply with Sunshine requirements)



**Emergency Meeting**: Emergency meetings are those called with less than a **24 hour notice** to act on item(s) related to an unforeseen event.

Similar to special meetings, emergency meetings may only cover topics related to the specific purpose of why the meeting was called.
